- FireSmart BC is the provincial program committed to helping British Columbians reduce their wildfire risk.
- FireSmart BC is the go-to resource for individuals, neighbourhoods and communities looking to protect themselves and their properties from wildfire.
- FireSmart BC is based on scientific research that shows that doing simple FireSmart tasks like mowing your lawn, cleaning your gutters and pruning your trees can make your property more resilient to wildfire.
- For a wildfire to ignite and grow, it needs fuel such as trees, grass or other vegetation.



- Embers can ignite materials around your home, causing significant damage or structure loss.
- Removing flammable materials and vegetation around your property and preventing embers from accumulating will significantly reduce the chance of your home igniting.

Questions & Answers

1. What can people do to mitigate the risk of wildfire in their communities?

- Mitigating wildfire risk is a shared responsibility.
- People can play a critical role in mitigating wildfire risks around their homes and properties by undertaking FireSmart initiatives.
- For example, residents can help protect their homes and community by:
 - Cleaning any dry debris like leaves or branches from under decks,
 - Making sure roofs and gutters are clean and clear,
 - Keeping lawns cut short (below 10 centimetres) – wildfire loves tall grass!,
 - Moving items like firewood, propane tanks, plastic toys, dog houses at least 10 M from structures.
 - Keeping trees and shrubs pruned and watered,
 - When planting new trees or plants, opt for the leafy variety that are more resistant to fire. Examples are poplar, birch, aspen, cottonwood, maple, alder, ash and cherry.

2. How does FireSmart work to mitigate wildfire risks to communities?

- Given the effects of climate change and the number of homes being developed in forested areas, B.C. residents are encouraged to undertake FireSmart activities to help protect their homes and neighbourhoods from wildfires.
- The FireSmart program was developed to help people reduce the risk of personal property damage due to wildfires.
- FireSmart is the Canadian standard recognized by all provinces and territories and is based on National Fire Protection Association standards that have evolved over the last 40 years.
- Local governments also have a role to play, by implementing FireSmart-related bylaws for new developments in the wildland/urban interface.

3. How is the Province helping people access FireSmart programs?

- Since 2018, over \$180 million has been invested in FireSmart community programs across B.C.
- In that time, 265 local governments and First Nations have been funded to undertake FireSmart activities, including 117 First Nations and 148 local governments.
- B.C. now boasts 90 local FireSmart Coordinators and 205 FireSmart recognized neighbourhoods.

4. What funding supports are available to communities to mitigate the risk of wildfires?

- To increase wildfire prevention and help keep people safe, the Province has taken action over the past six years to strengthen provincial and community capacity for wildfire mitigation and preparedness.
- We're supporting the efforts of local governments and First Nations to reduce wildfire risks in and around their communities.
- Since 2018, the Province has taken action in partnership with the Union of BC Municipalities and First Nations Emergency Services Society to reduce wildfire risk through FireSmart grants and supports, with \$185 million committed to date.



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- More than 350 projects have been completed, with more on the way. Budget 2024 also contains \$60 million for the Forest Enhancement Society of BC to continue industry and community focused wildfire risk reduction and fuel management.
